Caretaking Precious Resources:

Rare Plants, Trails and Habitat Restoration

What is a rare alpine plant worth? What is the value to future generations? We believe it's impossible to put a dollar figure on it. It is priceless.

Our work continued this year to find, document and monitor the unique alpine plants of the Mosquito Range. Hundreds of hours were spent documenting these tiny plants growing in the harsh alpine environment above 12,000 feet. We continue to provide detailed data, status and mapping information to universities, agencies and nonprofits dedicated to preserving these species.

It's not enough to savor the mountain beauty, we love to play in them too! We hosted six free community interpretive hikes to get more folks outside, develop volunteer relationships, make some new friends and further develop recreational awareness.

Biking, skiing, hiking, 4-wheeling, and more bring thousands of folks here annually and the damage can be devastating. That creates a critical need for trail maintenance. MRHI continues to perform maintenance on our adopted Tie Hack Trail and continues work on creating a large, legal recreational trail system.

We also dose illegally-created trails to reduce damage to fragile resources and restore alpine tundra damaged by irresponsible recreation. This year, MRHI partnered with Wildland Restoration Volunteers (WRV) on a project near Trout Creek. Twenty-four volunteers contributed 500 hours toward the project, valued at \$12,070. Volunteers closed and seeded 2400 feet of road, laying 19,200 square feet of seed, 9600 square feet of erosion control matting, benefiting an estimated 100 acres of adjacent habitat.

In total, MRHI habitat and trail projects protected and enhanced more than 2,500 acres of fragile mountain resources in 2017. Special thanks to our amazing volunteers, as well as South Park Ranger District, Wildlands Restoration Volunteers, South Park National Heritage Area, Patagonia, and The Summit Foundation for their support.







Creating Conservation Wonder in a New Generation:Children's Environmental Education

More than 300 children engaged in FREE adventure and science exploration this year thanks to you, our funders, and MRHI! From forests to wetlands, geology to ecology, children (and many parents) had the chance to get dirty, giggle and explore nature while discovering its wonders. Programs included a Nature Science Camp, weekly nature-themed July programs, noxious weed pulls, gardening, an autumn children's hike, and fall preschool field trips to explore our mountain resources. Avalanche education programs are slated yet for this winter!

By educating children and their families about the unique natural area of the Mosquito Range, we hope to build a stronger community that is more informed about and involved in preserving and protecting our mountain home. Youth are

one of our most valuable investments in caretaking precious resources for future generations.
